We also remember that HRH Prince Philip was the patron of the Radio Society of Great Britain since 1952, so the Royal family has been directly associated with the amateur radio service for some seven decades.

Swap Meet in Victoria



It was good to see ICOM attending the event and providing a handheld radio as the main prize in the raffle. In the parking lot a number of emergency groups, primarily from the Victoria area, displayed their equipment and emergency trailers.

Pactor 4 in the USA

Under normal circumstances the US Federal Communications Commission does not permit the use of the mode Pactor 4 on the HF bands in the USA. However, because of the huge impact of hurricane Ian the FCC has granted a 60-day waiver which permits Pactor 4 Winlink for hurricane relief. Pactor 4, permitted in Canada, has a faster throughput than Pactor 3 but does not exceed the permitted bandwidth of 6 KHz for most of the HF bands in Canada.

How is DX - David VA7DXX

In the July edition of the NARA Newsletter I mentioned the callsign 4U1ITU, the station at the Headquarters of the International Telecommunication Union (ITU) in Geneva. Recent reports suggest that 4U1ITU will be on the air only for a few more months and then likely off the air for some seven years. Apparently, the building which houses 4U1ITU is being rebuilt. Since 4U1ITU counts as a country for DXCC this is indeed unfortunate, and we can only hope that the hams in Geneva can find a way of keeping the station callsign on the air.

Radio conditions generally are improving as we move towards the peak of sunspot cycle 25, expected around December 2025. In early September I was tuning the lower end of 20m CW and heard VU2TMP (southern India) repeatedly calling CQ at 569 with no one replying. I called him and he struggled to hear me, but eventually received my callsign correctly. I have only contacted India ten times from Canada in the last 25 years so it was a good catch over the difficult North Pole path. A week later I managed to work 3B8/G4BUO who was on holiday in Mauritius.

With regard to the underutilized HF 60m band with the recent addition of three new countries - Botswana, Lesotho and Eswatini - there are now 89 countries who now permit 60m operation, including Canada of course. I have not been too active on the 60m band myself but according to my electronic

logbook I have worked 29 countries on the 60m band, the best distance being South Africa. There have been recent changes to the band frequency allocations in Canada, for details see https://www.rac.ca/two-new-bands-for-canadian-amateurs/

For those interested in the very low noise digital mode WSPR news that a new beacon has been established on Gough Island using the callsign ZD9SSS. The operating frequencies are 14.100, 18.110, 21.100, 24.930 and 28.126 MHz An interesting WSPR website is http://wspr.rocks.

The general improvement in band conditions and, at present the covid situation means that Dxpeditions, the lifeblood for a DXer, are retuning. In October the following Dxpeditions are anticipated: Marquesas (TX7G), Comoros (D60AE), Madagascar (the 5R8 callsign to be announced), Benin (TY0RU), Monaco (3A callsign to be announced), Belize (V3E), Saba & Sint Eustatius (PJ5 callsign to be announced) Cocos Keeling (VK9CM), Papua New Guinea (P29RO) and finally the one I shall be especially looking for Djibouti J28MD.

The VA7DXH FM repeater has certainly persuaded many to dust off their 220 MHz radios and get onto the band. The VA7DXH repeater, near Ladysmith, provides good hand held radio coverage over most of Nanaimo and much of Gabriola Island and is routinely worked by fixed stations in the Comox area.

With Christmas on the horizon it's worth knowing that several manufacturers make radios which work on the 220 MHz band.
